ANNUAL REPORT ON BEHALF OF OVERVIEW AND SCRUTINY BODIES

Purpose of the report

1. The purpose of this report is to summarise the main activities of the Scrutiny Commission and its Committees since the last annual report was submitted in June 2004. Subject to any comments the Commission may have, this report will be submitted to the County Council

Background

- 2. The Constitution requires that Overview and Scrutiny Committees should submit an Annual Report to the Council (or the Scrutiny Commission in a single report on their behalf) on their workings. The report may make recommendations about future work programmes and changes in working methods. This report is presented earlier than usual because it seems more appropriate to report on the work conducted by scrutiny under the current Council now than to report on it later in the year after a new County Council has been elected in May.
- 3. The previous Annual Report focused primarily on the findings of external assessments of the scrutiny process in Leicestershire, particularly the findings of the Audit Commission, and how the Council would respond to issues identified for attention. This Annual Report:
 - outlines the progress made on the work identified in the Post Audit Commission Inspection Action Plan;
 - describes the work of a number of five-member scrutiny review panels that have been operating during the period covered by the report;
 - describes the arrangements put in place to monitor performance
 - lists the issues considered by the Scrutiny Commission and the Scrutiny Committees between April 2004 and February 2005 (please see Appendix 2)
 - refers to comments on the effectiveness of Scrutiny from the Comprehensive Performance Assessment (CPA) conducted during October 2004;

 does **not** cover issues relating to overview and scrutiny of health; this is not within the terms of reference of the Scrutiny Commission. Arrangements for making an annual report on health scrutiny to the Council should be considered as the operation of health scrutiny in the authority is further developed.

<u>Progress on work identified in the Post-Audit Commission Inspection Action Plan</u>

- 4. The findings of the Audit Commission Inspection painted a generally positive picture of scrutiny in Leicestershire, recognising that appropriate procedures were in place and commending the guidance notes issued to members. However, the report identified a number of areas for improvement in practice, principally in relation to:
 - (a) members taking a more proactive role in setting work programmes;
 - (b) placing greater emphasis on the scrutiny of external bodies;
 - (c) involving external stakeholders and experts in scrutiny activity.

Progress made on these issues is summarised in paragraphs 5 to 10.

Proactive role in setting work programmes

- 5. The Scrutiny Reference Group met with Chairmen and Spokesmen of all the scrutiny committees to discuss:
 - the need for scrutiny committees to set their work programmes in such a way as to enable members to take a more proactive role:
 - the need for scrutiny committees to consider whether less time and effort could be spent on scrutinising plans and strategies and to adopt a more selective approach to this task;
 - what steps committees were taking to engage members and to develop a more proactive role for members in the process;
 - arrangements for developing work programmes, identification by members of issues which they wished to examine in more detail and the scope for setting up five member scrutiny review panels.

From this meeting a number of action points were agreed for each of the scrutiny committees. These are summarised in Appendix 1. All Scrutiny Committee Chairmen and Spokesmen now have regular meetings with the relevant Chief Officer to plan and manage their work programmes.

6. To assist members of scrutiny committees to consider and/or challenge the contents of reports all scrutiny committee agendas now include a checklist of questions.

Scrutiny of External Bodies

- 7. Following an investigation into the activities of the Early Years
 Development and Child Care Partnership, the Scrutiny Commission
 has promoted a number of key developments relating to partnership
 with external agencies. This work was led by officers of the County
 Council working closely with the Leicestershire Together Board which
 had been charged by the Government to consider possible
 rationalisation of partnership bodies. The Commission and Reference
 Group undertook a watching brief and received regular reports on:
 - issues relating to risk management, including specifically legal and financial risks and the development of an advice check list;
 - the Partnership Mapping exercise;
 - whether partnerships provide added value to the County Council; a further report on this will be received when the Partnership Mapping exercise is completed.
- 8. In April 2004 the Scrutiny Commission decided to scrutinise the activities of the two economic sub-regional partnerships operating within Leicestershire. The Chief Executives of the Leicester Shire Economic Partnership and The Welland Partnership were invited to make presentations to it on the role of their organisations, the progress they had made and their achievements to date. The information obtained from these presentations, together with additional information sought from both organisations, was put together by the Scrutiny Reference Group into a report to the Commission in September 2004. The report raised a number of issues, including the need for The Welland Partnership, the need for a rural economic strategy to be developed and the need for Sub Strategic Partnerships to have greater autonomy to make decisions to address particular areas of local concern. The report was referred to the Cabinet and submitted to the County Council on 22nd September 2004. The County Council resolved to refer the conclusions in the Commission's report to GOEM, EMRA and EMDA to have regard to in any future review of Sub-Regional Partnerships in Leicestershire and/or the East Midlands.

Involving External Stakeholders

- 9. In the past it has proved somewhat more problematic to identify appropriate people to advise meetings of Scrutiny Committees. The Council's new Consultation Standards should in part address the issue of ensuring that stakeholders' views are brought to the attention of Scrutiny Committees.
- 10. The involvement of stakeholders has been more successful in relation to five member scrutiny review panels. Details of the panels are listed later in the report. Examples of stakeholder involvement in five member panels include:

Five Member Scrutiny Review Panels

11. The following table gives information on the activities of five member scrutiny review panels that have undertaken, or are undertaking, reviews during the period covered by this report:

12. The five member panel process has worked well. Members of these panels have commented that they found the process particularly rewarding as it enabled them to delve in detail into the subject as well as providing an opportunity to directly engage with stakeholders and users. The work of the panels has also merited mention in local newspapers and the findings and conclusions of those panels that have reported have been endorsed by the Cabinet.

Monitoring Performance

13. Since the introduction of the Best Value Performance Plan, each scrutiny committee has received six monthly progress reports against targets and commitments therein. In the current year the performance management framework has changed so that quarterly reports are circulated to all members. The six monthly monitoring reports are broken down in respect of each scrutiny committee's area of responsibility and circulated to the relevant Chairmen and Spokesmen who are requested to consider the explanations provided for any significant variations in performance and satisfy themselves that appropriate measures are in place, or planned, to address underperformance. The Chairmen and Spokesmen have also been encouraged to refer any issues of concern to the Committee and Scrutiny Reference Group. Additionally, scrutiny committees have been encouraged to consider other sources of performance monitoring data in order to identify potential areas of activity that might merit detailed scrutiny.

Comments on the effectiveness of Scrutiny from the CPA conducted during October 2004

14. The previous Annual Report contained comments about the performance of Scrutiny in Leicestershire arising from the CPA conducted during July 2002. A further CPA of the County Council was conducted during October 2004 and its judgements were published in

December 2004, the Council being categorised as 'Excellent'. The following are extracts from the most recent CPA report:

'The role of scrutiny has been developed and the structure is fairly clear. It is scrutinising performance and issues important to the Council and the process allows expert witnesses and visits outside the authority. Issues that have been subject to scrutiny and led to change include the joint waste management strategy.'

'Overall, strengths in capacity continue to outweigh weaknesses. It has retained capable staff, management and senior members and responsibilities are clear. Good progress has been made in developing partnerships. However, the ability of all councillors to scrutinise some decisions effectively is unproven....'

'The scrutiny function is established although mixed messages arose over the ability of all members to effectively scrutinise some decisions and grasp the complexities in new areas such as the NHS where the scrutiny process has been relatively slow in getting going. It is acknowledged by the Council that scrutiny and councillor capability to scrutinise needs to develop.'

'There are good quality reports to councillors providing high-level financial performance data with sufficient detail of reasons for variances and actions taken. There is good use of simple indicators to identify successes and failures in performance monitoring of the medium term corporate strategy with detailed explanation provided for outcomes and progress, or lack of it, where appropriate. There is a clear use of PIs to drive improvement. All officers and councillors are very aware of performance.'

'The Council provides good individualised learning. There is member development although, as yet, training for councillors or chairs of scrutiny committees has been limited. Many councillors receive training, or personal development, at district council level, and an accreditation system avoids duplication. A good manager development programme is in place.'

Conclusion

15. Good progress has been made in addressing most of the issues raised by the Audit Commission's inspection of the scrutiny function in Leicestershire and this is largely confirmed by the most recent CPA inspection. The issue of training of councillors will need to be a priority for the new Council.

ACTION POINTS AGREED WITH THE SCRUTINY COMMITTEECHAIRMEN AND SPOKESMEN ON 26TH APRIL 2004

COMMUNITY SERVICES SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIONS:

- (i) Whilst recognising that as the newest Committee it had to have time to come to terms with its wide remit the Group felt that the time had come for the Committee to develop a greater sense of purpose and formulate a work programme for the coming municipal year. In developing its work programme the Committee was urged to have regard to the Departmental Service Plan for 2004/05.
- (ii) Having regard to the broad remit of the Committee consideration be given to a range of topics which may warrant examination by a five member panel.
- (iii) The Committee was advised to consider including in its work programme:
 - a review of the Administration's current policy on the future role of libraries and the shape of the network.
 - the implementation and impact of the Cultural Strategy agreed by the Council.
 - the Council's policy in response to the proposed closure of Post Offices in Leicestershire.
- (iv) The scope for involving/engaging with external stakeholders.

EDUCATION SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIONS:

- (i) Whilst recognising the amount of effective work undertaken by the Committee, the Group questioned whether a more rigorous and selective approach to the business brought to the Committee should be adopted.
- (ii) To produce an annual work and meetings programme.

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HIGHWAYS, TRANSPORTATION AND WASTE MANAGEMENT SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIONS:

- (i) Whilst the current five-member review is welcomed, the Committee should ensure that the Panel focuses on the strategic issues that the Council has to address in relation to existing policies on Road Safety rather than the local impact of individual schemes.
- (ii) Develop an annual work and meetings programme.

RESOURCES SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIONS:

- (i) The Committee should identify, and draw to the attention of service committees, any issues that emerge from the regular budget monitoring process.
- (ii) Whilst recognising that the Committee does consider the Corporate Asset Management Plan, it should examine the need for an in depth review of property management issues.

SOCIAL CARE SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIONS:

- (i) To produce an annual work and meetings programme.
- (ii) Continue to explore mechanisms for obtaining views of service users and carers and, in particular, to look into concerns expressed.
- (iii) Identify a small number of discrete areas of activity that would merit detailed scrutiny.
