SAFER COMMUNITIES PERFORMANCE 2019/20 QUARTER 3

Introduction

- 1. The purpose of this report is to update the Leicestershire Safer Communities Strategy Board (LSCSB) regarding Safer Communities performance for 2019/20 Q3.
- 2. The Safer Communities dashboard is now available as an interactive online dashboard <u>here</u>.

Dashboard development is ongoing and now incorporates additional key performance indicators (KPI's) to broaden understanding across each performance category. The underpinning data is included and can be seen by hovering the cursor over relevant points in the performance graphs.

- 3. The dashboard includes a rolling 12 months comparison between the previous and current year and the direction of travel for that indicator. Trend over time is shown for quarterly data. The bar charts show the Leicestershire districts compared to Leicestershire and the regional average where available.
- 4. The production of the online performance portal means data under each category is now readily available and accessible at any time. The increasingly complex dataset makes routine reporting across all performance areas impractical, unwieldy and unnecessary. The intention with this report going forward therefore is to move to exception reporting supplemented by a brief position statement under each performance category.

Summary

5. There is nothing exceptional to report. Overall crime and vehicle offences continue to show an adverse trend. Other performance indicators however remain stable or show positive direction of travel. Several new performance indicators have been added to the online dashboard.

Ongoing Reductions in Crime

- 6. There is nothing exceptional to report:
 - Burglary offences have stabilised with the current rolling 12 months similar to the previous rolling 12 months.
 - Violence with injury offences have started to stabilise over the last 4 quarters.
 - Vehicle offences continue to increase steadily but at a slower rate with the current rolling 12 months 10% higher than the previous rolling 12 months. The vehicle offence rate in Leicestershire (8.6) is higher than the regional average (6.8)
 - Overall Crime is still increasing, although the rate of increase has slowed. Most crime categories are performing in line or lower than the regional average, except vehicle crime which is slightly higher than the regional average.

Reducing Offending and Re-offending

- 7. Nothing exceptional to report although we are starting to see the first signs of the previously excellent reductions in reoffending levelling off.

For the current financial year 2019/20 latest figures April to September 2019 show there have been 52 FTEs.

- (b) The rate of re-offending by young offenders likewise is showing early signs of levelling. To add context this is following a sustained and lengthy positive downward trend. The April 2018 to March 2019 reoffending rate by young offenders was 1.37. This is an increase on the previous year's performance of 0.71. The latest data Apr-Sept 2019 shows a rate of 0.18.
- 8. A new indicator has been added to the dashboard. There is a large body of research suggesting employment may reduce the likelihood of re-offending. The Youth Offending performance figure for young offenders actively engaging in education, employment and training (EET) is 62% for the period April September 2019. This is slightly lower than the end of year figure 2018/19 of 64%.
- Additional indicators are also monitored including Integrated Offender Management (IOM) data and local Community Rehabilitation Company (CRC Probation) data. Neither reveals anything of note.

Repeat Victimisation and Vulnerable Victims

- 10. Several additional indicators have been added to the performance dashboard to supplement the MARAC repeat referral data and UAVA referral numbers already reported upon. The new KPI's focus on providing a broader understanding of performance across domestic and sexual abuse.
- 11. There is nothing exceptional to report; MARAC repeat referrals continue to increase (49%) however a recent change in criteria for referral has been identified as responsible. UAVA referrals (1887) continue to rise and other indicators are relatively stable and within expected levels.

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) and Satisfaction

- 12. The previous ASB performance data has now been expanded to cover two broad areas;
 - (a) Satisfaction there are two questions in the Community Based Survey (CBS) relevant to ASB Satisfaction. "% of people that agree ASB has decreased or stayed the same" and "the % who feel safe outside in their local area after dark". Responses to both questions have shown a positive upward trend in the last five quarters.
 - (b) ASB reporting this has been added to the online portal and there are now two sources as detailed below;
 - i. ASB extracted from the Police call management system, this is shown as 'Total ASB (rate per thousand population)' this is further broken down utilising the 'PEN' code and categorised as either 'Personal' 'Environmental' or 'Nuisance' ASB. This dataset is obtained when police call handlers deem a call is ASB and code the call accordingly. There is as such a caveat that calls are correctly categorised.
 - ii. ASB recorded on Sentinel (the partnership ASB case management system). This dataset contains all case managed reports of ASB sourced from both Police and Local Authority partners.

The two data sources are not distinct and there will inevitably be some duplication, for example not all reports of ASB will be case managed and find there way onto Sentinel, likewise reports made directly to local authorities will obviously not feature on the police call handling system.

Nothing exceptional to report; although unexpectedly the level of Sentinel reporting (12.41 per thou) is higher than the reported Police ASB figure (8.5 per thou).

Preventing terrorism and radicalisation

- 13. Nothing notable to report, two additional performance indicators have been added.
- 14. Hate incident reporting at 0.88 incidents per thousand is similar to the previous rolling 12 months (0.83). 64% were racial in nature, 19% were classified as sexual orientation and 8% were classified as disability. Numbers remain relatively low.
- 15. Racially or religiously aggravated crime is very low with 0.3 crimes per 1,000 population across Leicestershire.
- 16. A question from the Leicestershire Insight Survey asks residents how much they agree that people from different backgrounds get on well. 94% of respondents agreed that people in their area get on well together. This is the same as the previous year's response (94%).

Recommendations

17. The Board note the 2019/20 Q3 performance information.
