Improve attendance at schools and reduce permanent exclusions.	Frances Craven (Charlie Palmer Thelma Lewis)	Amber	Pupil attendance was the highest ever in primary schools in 06-07, improving by 0.46% on the previous year. Secondary school attendance also rose by 0.72%. The improvement is a result of better coordinated support to schools through the Attendance Strategy Group, an action plan reviewed termly, and guidance to schools to help them deal consistently and fairly with requests for holidays in term time.  Permanent exclusions fell in 06-07 to 112 from 144 the previous year. This is the lowest figure achieved since 2001-02. The reduction is a result of hard work in schools, improved partnership working through area panels, improved alternative provision, and better support for schools. All this work needs to continue to maintain the downward trend.

Develop and sustain District Youth Councils representative of local youth populations in partnership with District Councils, so that at least 50 young people are involved in each area with at least 4 District Youth Council meetings each year. NWL and H &amp; Bos have already engaged with 50 young people regularly.</li> <li>The other 3 District forums in the South Area have each had regular contact with 15- 20 young people. A summer roadshow organised by the youth forums attracted over 100 new contacts.</li> <li>Changes in Borough Council staff have disrupted joint developments but Charrnwood has seen the development of an Asian Voice group that meets weekly, with 14 regular attenders so far. A new launch conference has been held and regular meetings are now taking place.</li> <li>Regular meetings of a newly re-launched Youth Council are happening in Melton and in the Vale of Belvoir with a total of 25 young people engaged so far.</li> <li>Very successful youth conferences or other large consultation events (jointly funded and organised by staff from Youth Service and District Councils) have been held in Charnwood, Melton, Harborough, Hinckley &amp; Bosworth and NW Leicestershire. This was sufficient to meet most of our needs. 2 interagency adopters were obtained.  41 foster carers were approved in 06/07(53 in 05/06) performance on children who had three or more placement moves in a year remains in the top band (PAF CF/A1 and BVPI 49). Long term stability is largely unchanged from last year but is below the England average due to our different care population and good permanency planning. (PAF CF/D78) The use of Independent fostering agencies remains low but the use of residential care has increased
Continue to monitor our recruitment and retention policies to ensure we have sufficient foster carers of the right type to meet our placement matching needs. Information about those who leave fostering shows that most leave because they are kinship carers who have completed their task or who have obtained a permanency order
Continue to develop the exit interview process for foster carers.	Vanessa Bishop (Flick Schofield)	Green	Carers who stop fostering are being sent exit questionnaires but insufficient numbers of these have been returned to enable any meaningful analysis.
Continue to monitor enquiries about fostering to test the effectiveness of our promotional activity, and encourage family and friends to become child specific foster carers where this is feasible. There are good systems to approve family and friends as carers where this is appropriate. 22 of the 41 carers approved were child specific carers. These carers are not encouraged to remain as long term foster carers but to become permanent carers by obtaining adoption or Special Guardianship orders. (The use of SGO's is above the national average)
Continue work to establish a new service to support vulnerable young people through intensive multi-agency support and intervention. The service will be trialled in Melton and Charnwood and then rolled out across Leicestershire from 2007 to 2009.	Frances Craven Vanessa Bishop (Flick Schofield)	Amber (because roll out delayed from plan)	This service currently includes one worker and a commissioning budget, and is working alongside the development of multi-agency forums to provide support to lead professionals with particularly complex cases. The trail has focussed on North West Leicestershire as the area most advanced in multi-agency working. The project is still exploring different models of working, and is highly innovative and developing rapidly.

	Reverse the trend of year on year net loss of foster placements	Vanessa Bishop (Flick Schofield) (Cath Sartoris)		In 2006/07 we approved slightly more foster carers than we lost, 41 were approved and 39 were deregistered. The recruitment of foster carers remains very challenging, there is increasing competition from the independent sector. Each year we have increased the number of people making enquiries about becoming foster carers but many withdraw when they fully understand the challenges of the task. We are continuing with our active recruitment strategy. In 2007/08 we will be recruiting 'task centered' foster carers, who will receive a competitive fee. We will also be targeting small community groups with recruitment publicity.
