CONSULTATION/ COMMUNICATIONS	The Panel has already consulted VAL. It will now consult with other voluntary/community sector groups and organisations, the Interfaith Forum, District/Borough Councils, the Police, County Council departments and representatives of the business community. [It will be necessary to programme in regular reports from the Review Panel to the Scrutiny Commissioners to ensure that the focus of the review remained appropriate, given the rapidly changing agenda, both nationally and locally, and the range of issues which the Panel could consider.]	
PUBLICITY	The outcome of the review will be published. The Council has good channels for consulting with the VCS and related stakeholders so it is unlikely wider publicity will be required. The Panel might choose to publicise the review to ensure wider representations.	
RISKS AND BARRIERS	The Panel has already identified that there is a lack of clarity emerging from central government – this remains a risk. There is also a risk that the review may become too unwieldy and unfocused, given the broad topic at hand. The austere public sector spending environment will be a key constraint on the practicality of different policy responses and will need to be taken into account in the Panel's recommendations.
